The Jeanne Clery Disclosure of Campus Security Policy and Campus Crime Statistics Act (commonly known as the Clery Act) is federal legislation designed to provide students, prospective students, and the public with uniform information from universities throughout the country on criminal problems and police and security issues. This brochure meets all reporting requirements as set forth in the Clery Act. Criminal statistics are updated by October 1 of each year and include data from the three previous calendar years.

You may obtain the full text of this report on our website (<http://police.csUMB.edu>), in our FirstClass conference folder (Police Department), and in written form. This report is prepared in cooperation with surrounding federal and municipal police agencies, the Office of Residential Life, and the Student Conduct Office. Each entity provides updated information for the report.

To comply with this act the University Police Department requests crime statistics from local police agencies for public property immediately adjacent to the campus. The university has no off-campus facilities and no fraternities and sororities. Student organization recognition does not extend beyond the campus boundaries.

Incoming students receive written notification of this report during the admission process. Directions to locate the report on the website are included in the class schedule and the CSUMB catalog. All prospective students and employees receive information on how to access the report. Reporting Crime to Police

The University Police Department is a fully certified, state law enforcement agency providing a complete range of services within the campus community. As the primary law enforcement agency on university property, the University Police Department is responsible for all aspects of public safety. Officers are available at any time to respond to reports of criminal activity, suspicious circumstances, traffic collisions, safety hazards, and medical and fire emergencies (in conjunction with other emergency service providers). Officers have the authority to arrest individuals pursuant to California Penal Code Section 836.

Criminal complaints and other investigations will be handled by police personnel from inception to completion. When appropriate, criminal investigations will be referred to the Office of the Monterey County District Attorney for prosecution. Criminal matters and other forms of misconduct involving CSUMB students, employees, and residents may also be referred to the appropriate University administrator for corrective action. The complete, accurate, and prompt reporting of all crimes to the University Police Department is essential for successful investigation and prosecution. Prompt action can prevent the perpetrator from committing additional crimes.

The University Police Department will make timely warning reports to members of the campus community regarding criminal activity in certain circumstances. The criminal activity must be serious in nature and likely to pose an ongoing threat to the safety of students and employees. The decision to make a timely warning report will be made by the Chief of Police. Notification will generally be made through email postings and the distribution of flyers.

Public information regarding sex offenders in California may be obtained by viewing the Megan's Law CD-ROM at the Monterey County Sheriff Department, 1414 Natividad Road, Salinas, CA 93906. The CD-ROM is available for viewing on Monday, Wednesday, and Friday from 1:00 to 5:00 p.m.

Anyone wishing to report the criminal offenses described in the Clery Act for the purpose of making timely warning and inclusion in the annual statistical disclosure should contact the University Police Department at 831-655-0268 or, if an emergency, by calling 911. A police officer will respond to your location or, if you wish, contact you by phone. Victims or witnesses who wish to report crimes on a voluntary, confidential basis for inclusion in the annual disclosure of crime statistics may do so by calling our Tip Line at 831-582-4747, or by calling Criminal Investigations at 831-582-3061. In addition we urge pastoral and professional counselors of the Personal Growth and Counseling Center to inform the persons they are counseling of these procedures for reporting crime on a voluntary, confidential basis.

Policy on Drugs and Alcohol

CSUMB complies with the Drug Free Workplace Act of 1990 and the Higher Education Act section 120(a). CSUMB is committed to maintaining a safe and healthy environment for the campus community. Alcohol and other drugs cannot be allowed to interfere with the mission of the university.

The sale, manufacture, distribution, possession, or use of any controlled substance as defined in the California Health and Safety Code is illegal. The University Police Department strictly enforces such laws. Violators are subject to criminal prosecution.

The consumption, sale, or furnishing of alcoholic beverages on campus is severely restricted. All state and local laws regulating alcoholic beverages will be enforced, including the use of alcohol by minors. Use of alcoholic beverages in university residences is subject to state law and university regulations. All queries regarding drug and alcohol laws in the state of California and their enforcement at CSUMB should be directed to 831-582-3360.

Violation of alcohol and drug laws may result in university disciplinary action in addition to any criminal prosecution. CSUMB students are subject to disciplinary action up to and including expulsion. University employees are subject to disciplinary action up to and including termination of employment.

Excessive use of alcohol and other drugs is a serious health problem. In addition, alcohol and drug use can contribute to a host of other problems such as unwanted pregnancy, violent behavior, psychological depression, and HIV infection and other sexually transmitted diseases.

Substance abuse prevention and assistance programs are available for employees and students. The Personal Growth and Counseling Center (PGCC) provides a range of programs and services for students including residence hall presentations, the monthly Alcohol and Other Drug Education Class (in conjunction with Residential Life and the UPD), peer and professional counseling, and weekly AA and Al-Anon meetings. Students can contact the PGCC reception desk at 831-582-3969 for appointments and further information about specific programs. University Human Resources coordinates assistance for employees. Magellan Behavioral Health serves as the Employee Assistance Program (EAP) provider for the university. Magellan offers alcohol and drug abuse counseling for CSUMB employees. Graduation Rates

Institutions of higher education are required to disclose information to prospective and current students about graduation rates for first-time freshmen. The California State University draws its first-time freshmen from the top one-third of California's high school graduates. Since 1960, the CSU has awarded more than 1.2 million baccalaureate degrees in hundreds of program areas. More than any other senior institution in California, the CSU has maintained access for students who need to juggle academic life with work and family obligations. The rate of graduation will vary depending upon the needs of the individual student to balance work, school, and family priorities. Information specific to California State University, Monterey Bay appears below. Additional information regarding graduation rates of first-time freshmen is available from the CSUMB Office of Institutional Assessment and Research.

The California State University, Monterey Bay academic structure includes four colleges: Arts, Humanities, and Social Sciences; Professional Studies; Science, Media Arts and Technology; and Undergraduate Programs. Operating on a semester-based academic calendar, CSUMB currently offers baccalaureate degrees in 13 majors with over 30 included concentrations, as well as four master's degree programs and several teacher credential options. CSUMB's four-year graduation rate for regularly and specially admitted first-time freshmen is 15 percent, the five-year rate is 36 percent, and the six-year rate is 43 percent.

Programs

Police personnel present programs on a variety of topics to students, employees, and residents as requested. Programs include Sexual Assault Prevention, Self-Defense, Theft Prevention, Home Security, Personal Safety, Kid Print and Photo Identification, and Neighborhood Watch.

In addition, the University Police Department is involved in the orientation of new students and their parents, and the training of student educators. Orientation programs stress safety measures and general crime prevention strategies. Police personnel are often invited to speak in courses to provide an overview of the University Police Department, the services provided, current crime issues, and crime prevention strategies.

Crime Statistics

The statistics listed to the right provide an overall picture of crime at CSUMB from January 1 to December 31 for 2000, 2001, and 2002. This report meets all reporting requirements as set forth in the Jeanne Clery Disclosure of Campus Security Policy and Campus Crime Statistics Act. Criminal statistics are updated by September 1 of each year and include data from the three previous calendar years.

Access to Campus Facilities

The University Police Department provides special access to facilities to authorized persons with proper identification. Authorized persons having difficulty gaining access to an area or needing assistance securing a building or room should contact the University Police Department.

The University grounds are open to the public. Access to residential areas is limited to residents, their guests, and authorized university employees. University police officers patrol the campus grounds and buildings to monitor the security condition of all facilities. The University Police Department makes recommendations concerning the maintenance of campus buildings as they relate to security issues. The recommendations include:

- ~ Trimming ground cover, bushes, and trees to provide for greater visibility.
- ~ Repairing and replacing inoperative or vandalized lighting fixtures, windows, door locks and security hardware.

Sexual Assault Reporting and Prevention

CSUMB considers any act of sexual assault as a serious matter requiring immediate response. Victims of sexual assault will receive immediate and compassionate attention. Perpetrators of sexual assault will be vigorously prosecuted.

Victims of any sexual assault occurring on campus are strongly encouraged to notify the University Police Department as soon as practical. Sexual assaults occurring in neighboring municipalities, unincorporated county land, or the Ord Military Community should be reported to the appropriate local law enforcement agency. CSUMB staff members, including those from Residential Life and the Personal Growth and Counseling Center, will assist the student in notifying the appropriate law enforcement agency if the student requests such assistance.

Successful prosecution often hinges on the preservation of physical evidence. Therefore, the University Police Department urges victims to not shower, bathe, or douche; to not clean the crime scene; and to not dispose of or clean any clothing or bedding related to the assault. With the victim's consent, the University Police Department will initiate a criminal investigation and will assist the victim in obtaining medical and counseling services. Victims not desirous of criminal prosecution are still encouraged to contact the police. An anonymous report can reduce the risk of further assaults. A victim not wishing any police involvement may contact any of the following university and community resources:

Procedures for campus discipline dictate that both the accuser and the accused are entitled to the same opportunities to have others present during any campus disciplinary proceeding. Both the accuser and the accused shall be informed of the outcome of any campus proceeding alleging a sexual assault including the final determination and sanction, if imposed.

CSUMB may impose sanctions against students, student organizations, faculty members, or staff members identified as committing or participating in rape, acquaintance rape, or other forcible or non-forcible sex offenses. As provided in Section 41301 of Title 5, California Code of Regulations, sanctions for students include probation, suspension, or expulsion. The most severe university sanctions are expulsion for students, withdrawal of recognition for a student organization, and termination for an employee.

Student victims of sexual assault may change their academic and living situations after an alleged sexual assault where such changes are reasonably available.

The University Police Department and other campus and community organizations offer education programs to promote the awareness of rape, acquaintance rape, and other sex offenses. Residential Life offers many programs in the residence halls and the apartments on rape education and prevention, particularly the role of alcohol in sexual assault. Programs include movies, role-playing, discussion, and outside speakers. The Monterey Rape Crisis Center, a community group, offers prevention and self-defense programs on campus when requested. The University Police Department offers classes on personal safety, rape prevention, and the role of alcohol in sexual assaults. All programs given by the University Police Department are free and presented on demand for any class or group.
